THE RECTOR'S REPORT

This is inevitably a short report as reports go, but what is contained here is my initial musings on the first four months in post.

The first comment I make concerns the warmth of welcome that both Maggie and myself have received both from the congregation and the wider community. I would be telling a lie if I did not also acknowledge that we are both on a steep learning curve with regard to our new life in the USA. That said, I feel it necessary to state that I in no way wish to make St George's a carbon copy of an English parish, but I am determined to respect and uphold the very best of the tradition that I have inherited here, and to this end I will work collaboratively with the Wardens and Vestry to facilitate new growth and development within the existing structures of St George's.

I have come to love the traditional Rite 1 liturgy and I have always loved the traditional music of the Church, and to this end I will work hard at establishing a vibrant music program, naturally within the boundaries of our present financial constraints. We here at St George's offer a quality liturgy and spirituality that is now rare in the area, and I hope that with informed preaching and teaching, good music, and reverent worship this Church can grow and attract new members, especially those who seek a more traditional way of worship in contrast to the style of so many modern Churches, thus making a significant contribution to the city and beyond. This I know we already try do via the medium of local television, and the opportunities this affords us when we suddenly find ourselves beamed into the heart of people's homes, is a major evangelistic and pastoral privilege. We need to invest even more time and energy into this unique area of evangelism!

I am also aware that many churches today have a real accent on work with children and young people, and speaking personally, I have come from a parish with a large contingent of young people, and I know that many bemoan the fact that we here at St George's are somewhat short of the very young. This is indeed true, but as I roam the Stockade and adjacent areas, I am aware that we have fewer children and young people than in many other parts of the city, but let us not wring our hands in defeat at this problem, but let us concentrate on the people who are already presenting themselves for our ministry. I am aware that people often forget that the older generation has a real spirituality also, and that as we get older, our spiritual needs grow, not diminish – I therefore commit St George's and my own ministry to all who present themselves to us, especially the older generation. I am as your Rector therefore fully committed to pastoral visitation ministry, to hospital ministry at Ellis and Sunnyview, and to a broad pastoral care of those who need us most.

That said, we do touch a number of younger people who come from GE and beyond to our Friday lunchtime Mass, and it is my intention to make the Friday 12:15 p.m. Mass a Rite II liturgy with a short homily in the hope that some of the younger folk will be more familiar with the format. Also our Sunday evening session once a month "Seekers and Keepers" is deliberately designed to introduce the newcomer to the breadth of the Church's life and liturgy, but also to revive the customs perhaps forgotten by the long standing membership who need to keep their faith fresh.

Now let me take you from active faith, liturgical and spiritual matters to the buildings of St George's and their use. I am acutely aware that as things stand at present we have too many buildings which are greatly underused, but which cost us thousands of dollars to maintain and heat. I am with the Vestry actively exploring avenues of use that will not only save us money, but will generate new and significant income from the property we own around the Church – we must be good stewards of everything entrusted to our care. It seems to me that we must concentrate our efforts on maintaining the Church itself to a high standard, fit for purpose and solid for future use. It is no surprise that our steeple will in the not too distant future need serious attention, and such attention will be costly, even with grants and gift aid.

As you can see, I have my work cut out, and my days are already very full. I look forward to working with you all on these exciting projects which in turn under God's guidance and grace should and will facilitate new growth, new hope and new vision.

Before I close, I wish to record my own personal indebtedness to Donna Vrooman our Parish Administrator for her diligent and professional work supporting my ministry to you the people of St George's since my arrival. It is also fitting that I pay tribute to my brother priest, Fr Wampler for the priestly fellowship we share and the help he offers me on a weekly basis. I must also mention our hard working Churchwardens, I salute them and thank them for the care and support they have given me since my arrival, their support and guidance has been vital as I have settled into the parish. Lastly, but by no means least, is Maggie, my wife, my sincere thanks to her, for without her daily love and support I know that I would fail miserably in my tasks as your pastor and priest.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

2009 was highlighted by the completion of the rectory renovations. After years of deferred maintenance, much more than a cosmetic refreshing was required. The plumbing was essentially replaced throughout. The electrical system was upgraded and modernized, with provisions for 21st century data transmission added. The alarm system was extended into the attic to provide added protection from fire damage. The heating system was improved, both by replacing inefficient electric baseboard heaters with radiators and by increasing the insulation in the exterior walls. The kitchen was completely gutted, with new cabinets, countertops, and appliances bringing it up to date.

While the majority of the rectory work required professional contractors, there was also a tremendous parish effort to clean and complete smaller tasks that were not in the financial budget. From basement to attic, years of accumulated junk was removed and sold at the tag sale if it had value or hauled to the dump. The basement was reconfigured and the floors were cleaned and painted.

The grounds behind the rectory were also cleaned, again by a dedicated group of parish volunteers. Trash piled up behind the house was removed and piles of yard waste were cut up, chipped up, and hauled away. The stone patios were repaired and leveled. During the summer a large maple tree was struck by lightning and damaged beyond recovery. That had to be removed by a tree service company.

In preparation for Fr. Paul's arrival the offices were also cleaned and repainted. The windows were repaired and new window treatments were installed. A leak led to the weakening of plaster in the ceiling, eventually bringing down a large portion of the suspended ceiling, which had to be repaired by a contractor.

After too much delay resulting from the illness of the original craftsman, a new fence expert was brought on to finally complete the restoration of the historic wrought iron fence in front of the Church. The job is 99% complete, with the re-hanging of the gates anticipated in the spring.

There were several repairs that needed to be made to the physical plant in 2009. As part of work to bring the Church heating system back to life asbestos was found. This had to be cleaned up before work could progress. Several small leaks in the various roofs had to be repaired; in 2010 we anticipate having to take those on with a larger effort. The parking lot also received much needed attention, the low spots and holes were filled in, a new layer of black top was applied, and fresh striping completed the job.

In 2009 the parish came together to address numerous tasks, enjoying fellowship and the satisfaction of a job well done. We are looking forward to building on these efforts in 2010. Thank you to everyone for the generous gift of your time and talent in the upkeep of our tremendous Church!

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

Since its inception, four issues of *The Georgian Report*, the quarterly newsletter of St. George's, have been published – December 2008 and May, September and December 2009. Registered parishioners receive their copy in the mail. There is a mailing list for Georgian friends, Stockade neighbors and clergy from the Albany Diocese. Distribution points include places like Arthur's, and extra copies are available on the Tract Table in the narthex as well as the church office. Two hundred copies of each issue are printed.

Jon Pearson continues to update St. George's website on a regular basis. A pictorial story with captions on The Institution and Induction of Fr. Paul Blanch was the latest addition under Activities. Other current subjects include the fence restoration, our flower gardens (as photographed by Jennafer Thiessen), and rectory renovations/work days. The Gazette sent a photojournalist to Fr. Paul's Institution; the article with picture was reproduced on the website under Publicity. *The Georgian Report* is also posted on our website. We will be adding a page on Outreach in the very near future.

Pictures taken at Fr. Paul's Institution by Bob and Lynn Paska were posted on one of the bulletin boards in the Great Hall. Parishioners were encouraged to take their picture home as a memento of the occasion.

Thanks to Johnnie Angus, we have been recording each Sunday mass, which are then distributed to our local public access television stations. Currently, they are broadcast on Sundays on Channel 16 (Schenectady) and Thursdays on Channel 18 (Albany). For those Sundays when we cannot record the mass, Fr. Paul has generated a series of instructional video recordings, each highlighting a different aspect of our liturgy and our faith. These generic videos will be provided to Channels 16 and 18 to maintain our weekly programming commitment to the stations

The Parish Directory was completed and distributed in June. This was the first parish directory we have had in 13 years. This directory was designed for periodic updates, so new and returning parishioners can easily be added. We have tentatively scheduled March 2010 for the next round of photography sessions for inclusion in the current directory.

OUTREACH REPORT

“What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works?” James 2

In keeping with St George’s ongoing desire and commitment to be a blessing to the community, several outreach initiatives were undertaken in 2009. The parish’s efforts included ongoing ministries as well as special seasonal projects.

Ongoing Ministries

- ✚ Weekly collections of various requested food items were donated to the **SICM food pantry**. 6 drop-offs to the food pantry on Albany Street were done in 2009 with the average donation totalling about 80 pounds.
- ✚ 15 used cell phones were given to the **YWCA** for reprogramming for the battered women the YWCA serves.
- ✚ In the fall, St George’s began collecting used eyeglass frames in support of the **Lions**
- ✚ In February, St George’s began a monthly relationship with the **Lighthouse**, a group home run by Bethesda House, in which the parish donates one set of weekend day meals once a month.

Special Projects

In addition to St George’s ongoing ministries, the parish also accomplished:

- ✚ For Valentine’s Day, the parish donated 45 useful, special treat bags to **Mohawk Opportunities**, a non-profit that provides treatment, rehabilitation and recovery services to people who have a psychiatric diagnosis or have been diagnosed with HIV/AIDS. Church school students helped create St George’s colorful, artistic gift bags.
- ✚ As a Lenten outreach, the parish collected undergarments that were distributed to **Things Of My Very Own and St Stephens** for Pat Jones’s Schenectady County Jail ministry.
- ✚ During the week of August 3rd St George’s volunteered at MacGathan Townhouses in support of the **SICM summer lunch program**.
- ✚ In August, school supplies and backpacks were collected for distribution to needy Schenectady County foster children through **Things Of My Very Own**. The parish generously outfitted 25 backpacks that were gratefully received.
- ✚ In October/November a total of 50 winter outer garments were collected for **Conifer Park**, a private health care system that provides quality, cost-effective care to those suffering from alcoholism or chemical dependency.
- ✚ On November 11th, St George’s took a full table (\$250) at the **Salvation Army’s** holiday bell-ringer kick-off breakfast.
- ✚ Also in November, St George’s made a \$1500 donation to **Bethesda House** for their new facility’s residential apartment program.
- ✚ During advent a collection of first class postage stamps and Christmas cards was given to **St Stephens** for inmates at the Schenectady County jail.
- ✚ A box was placed at the rear of the church to collect unwrapped toys for the **Toys for Tots program**.

Georgians’s responses to the various 2009 outreach efforts were generous, thoughtful and supportive. As a corporate body our parish continues to seek ways in which the many talents of our congregation can be utilized in heeding our call to serve. Suggestions of local organizations to support and ways in which to do so are welcome.

PASTORAL CARE REPORT

Making calls to the hospital, private homes, care facilities and expanding our outreach to the Scotia Manor where the numbers desiring the Holy Sacrament increase with each visit. It has been a great experience watching him interact with those we visit with sincere interest and deep compassion tempered with a ready sense of humor.

This year with the help of Bob and Lynn Paska we brought new light to Pastoral Care through the articles on those we serve in the newsletter. Those spotlighted have been so pleased to have been recognized. Look for more in the months to come.

Pastoral Care would not be possible without the help of the entire Parish as the committee has a limited number of eyes and ears. We need you to tell us about those who you feel need care. Never assume that someone else has already told us about someone in the hospital or sick at home. Donna Vrooman is such a help in all phases of our work. Wendy Madelone and Nancy Angus help with our card ministry and Joyce Kapusta and Joan Bessarab bring joy to those we visit. Father Wampler has done yeoman's duty for many years.

While numbers do not reflect the importance of Pastoral Care to those served, they do give a sense of what we do.

Personal Visits (private homes,hospitals, care facilities)	96
Communions received	111
Telephone calls	91
Cards	350 (approximate number)

Note that the number of Communions actually exceeds the number of visits. That is because increasingly as we visit, others are asking to be included in the administration of the Blessed Sacrament. What a testament to the need that exists. We are privileged to try to meet that need.

Meals are not listed as a separate category because we no longer have a need to stockpile casseroles. We do provide meals on an "as needed" basis but most of our food effort has been focused on working with the Missions Committee and the Lighthouse Project.

The Pastoral Care Committee is thankful for the opportunity to try to do God's work at St. George's and in the greater community. If you would like to join our efforts please let Father Paul or any member of the committee know.

GARDEN REPORT

The gardens at St. George's were lovely this past year. The Knockout roses in the Shaw lounge planter bloomed all summer. The parking lot entrance to the church grounds was cleaned and the trees and bushes were trimmed. New plants were added giving our most used entrance a fresh colorful look.

At the same time, the beds at the front of the church were re-landscaped. Bushes were trimmed and revitalized, and new annual and perennial plantings were added. The lily bed on the patio bloomed for the first time in June which put on a spectacular show. They continued to bloom into late October. A new iris bed was just planted on the south side of the church and that work will continue this spring. The front lawn received a top dressing of soil and re-seeding and was doing nicely at the end of the season. Thanks to Cornell Cooperative Extension greenhouses, we were able to plant 2000+ annual plants on the grounds. Thanks to Susanna Sherwood and family, a tree that died was able to be replaced in the memorial garden.

GARDEN 2010

The 2010 garden work has already begun. In the middle of January on a balmy 40 degree day, the knock out roses and some of the burning bushes were trimmed.

We're going to be included in the Stockade Secret Gardens tour in June. Any background information and pictures on the history of the memorial garden would be very useful to our committee. This would help us to prepare a handout about our gardens for the tour. Things will be copied and returned, please see Rosemary Pannone with any information you have.

Our annual spring cleanup and plantings will be geared towards being ready for the tour. We expect to ask the Cooperative Extension for a similar number of plants to what we had the previous year.

The first big project will be to build the new rose bed next to the arbor in the Memorial garden. The Memorial garden will be getting a much needed revitalization after years of only minimal upkeep.

The lily bed will have daffodils added next fall for a longer seasonal show.

We are currently attempting to have our Glastonbury Thorn tree recognized by the National Tree Registry. If anyone has background or pictures of this tree please contact Rosemary Pannone.

A List of perennial plants and roses are available if you would like to contribute to the church gardens. These plants are needed to continue the revitalization of St. Georges Gardens. Marked catalogues and lists are available in the Great Hall after church on Sundays or see Rosemary Pannone.

As Master plans are finished they will be posted on a bulletin board near the hall entrance so all can keep track of the plans for planting and see our progress.

There are always opportunities to help in the garden, from digging, weeding, planting to simple dead heading picture taking and someone to keep our bulletin board up to date.

We always need fresh ideas.

Please keep an eye out for notice of the first Grounds and Gardens committee meeting in February. Please come with your ideas and contribute to our Landscape Plan.

LAWN & GARDEN REPORT **for 23 Front St. & Church Lawns**

During the growing season of 2009, the following was completed at the Rectory:

- Estimated 1500 man-hours went into lawn & garden work
- Fence from behind the garage was moved to the property line
- Moved a gate to the back of the brownstone property line
- Recycled some of the stockade fence to make doors for the shed
- Lower walls were power washed
- Green patio blocks were reset and squared off & loose gray stones were removed
- Grass seed was planted around the upper patio
- Roto-tilled dirt, leveled the ground & planted grass seed by the walls in the yard
- Three flower gardens were designed and planted with the use of plants from various members of the church
- Old & diseased trees were cut down and removed from the yard
- 20 loads of brush and yard debris were removed & taken to the landfill
- Lawn was fertilized 6 times from April thru November
- Lawn was treated 4 times for weeds

Plans for 2010

- Level blue stone on the lower patio
- Move fence located at lower patio to the property line
- Sand blast & paint iron work at rear of property
- Fertilize and apply weed treatment 4 to 5 times during the season

Work completed on Church lawns during growing season of 2009

- Weed treatment started in May and ran thru September
- Lawn was fertilized in June and three additional months afterwards

Plans for Church lawns for 2010

- Fertilize and apply weed treatment 4 to 5 times during the season

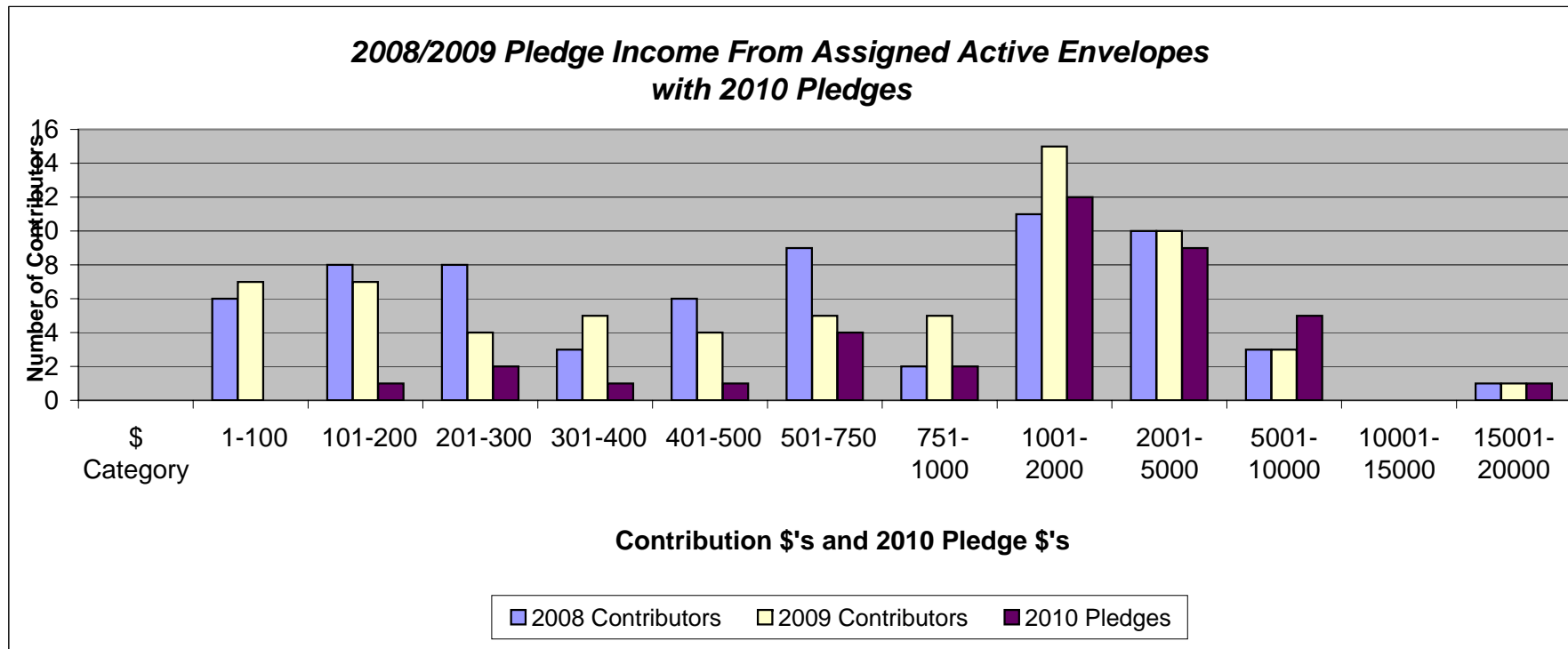

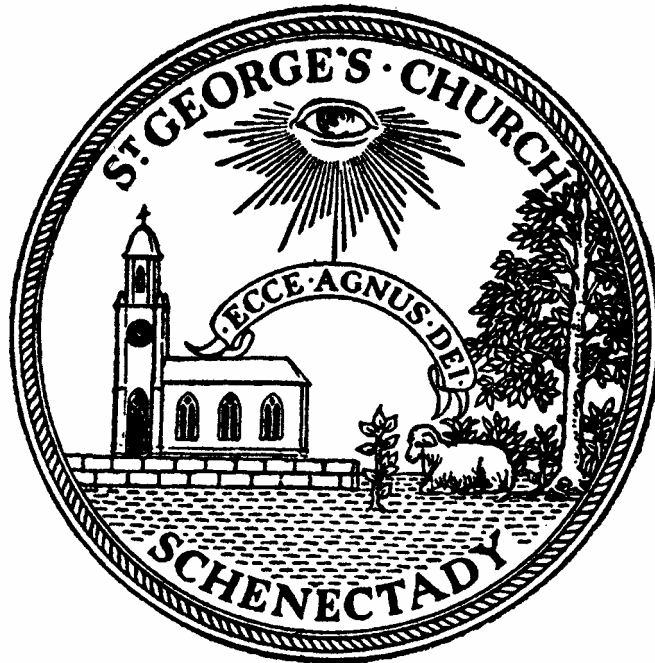
